

AN ORDINANCE SETTING WEIGHT LIMITS ON CERTAIN
ROADS IN HEIDLEBERG TOWNSHIP, YORK COUNTY,
PENNSYLVANIA, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR
VIOLATION THEREOF.

This ordinance is an amendment to and restatement of
Ordinance No. 90-2.

It is in the best interest of the general public with
respect to securing the safety of persons and property within
Heidelberg Township, hereinafter referred to as the township, to
restrict certain roads based upon the weight of the vehicles
traveling upon or using the same, due to the nature of land
development and uses adjoining these roads, or due to the
physical condition or configuration of the roads or bridges
located thereon.

Accordingly, be it ordained by the Board of Supervisors of
Heidelberg Township, York County, Pennsylvania, and it is hereby
ordained by the authority of the same as follows:

1. Unless otherwise defined herein all terms shall have
the same meanings as set forth in The Vehicle Code, Act of
June 17, 1976, P.L. 162, No. 81, 75 Pa.C.S.A. §101 et seq. as
amended. The term road shall have the same meaning as the term
highway set forth in The Vehicle Code. The term township shall
have the same meaning as the term local authorities.

2. (a) It shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle having
a weight in excess of five (5) tons on any of the following
roads:

(i) T-376 (Menges Mills Road) from its intersection with
Pa. Route 116, SR 0116 (York Road) on the northern side of Pa.
Route 116, SR 0116 (York Road) to its intersection with SR 3072
(Old Hanover Road).

(ii) T-382 (Mill Road) from its intersection with Pa. Route
116, SR 0116 (York Road) to its intersection with T-376 (Menges
Mill Road).

(iii) T-371 (Hill Top Drive) from its intersection with Pa.
Route 116, SR 0116 (York Road) on the southern side of Pa. Route

116, SR 0116 (York Road) to its intersection with SR 3047 (Porters Road).

(b) It shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle having a weight in excess of twelve (12) tons on any of the following roads:

(i) T-373 (Cannery Road) from its intersection with Pa. Route 116, SR 0116 (York Road) to its intersection with SR 3045 (Smith Station Road).

(ii) T-374 (Yingling Drive) from its intersection with SR 3045 (Smith Station Road) to its intersection with T-378 (Thoman Drive).

(iii) T-378 (Thoman Drive) from its intersection with T-374 (Yingling Drive) to its intersection with T-403 (Sterner Drive).

(iv) T-403 (Sterner Drive) from its intersection with T-378 (Thoman Drive) to its intersection with SR 3080 (Marburg Road).

(c) It shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle having a weight in excess of ten (10) tons for a single vehicle or fifteen (15) tons for a combination vehicle on any of the following roads:

(i) T-344 (Gitts Run Road) from its intersection with the Penn Township municipal boundary on the west to Pa. Route 116, SR 0116 (York Road).

The restricted roads within the township are more particularly shown on the road map attached hereto as Exhibit A.

3. The township shall erect signs setting forth the weight restrictions in accordance with the rules and regulations promulgated by the Department.

4. Any person operating a vehicle or combination upon a highway or bridge in violation of a prohibition or restriction imposed under this ordinance is guilty of a summary offense and shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine of \$75.00, except that any person convicted of operating a vehicle with a gross weight in excess of a posted weight shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine of \$150.00 plus \$150.00 for each 500 pounds, or part thereof, in excess of 3,000 pounds over the maximum allowable weight.

5. These weight restrictions set forth in this ordinance shall not apply to vehicles making deliveries to places located


on the roads or to farm equipment used in agricultural operations being conducted at properties immediately adjacent to these roads, nor shall the weight restrictions apply to emergency vehicles or municipal maintenance vehicles.

6. All ordinances or resolutions or parts of the same which are inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.


7. This ordinance shall become effective five (5) days after the date hereof.





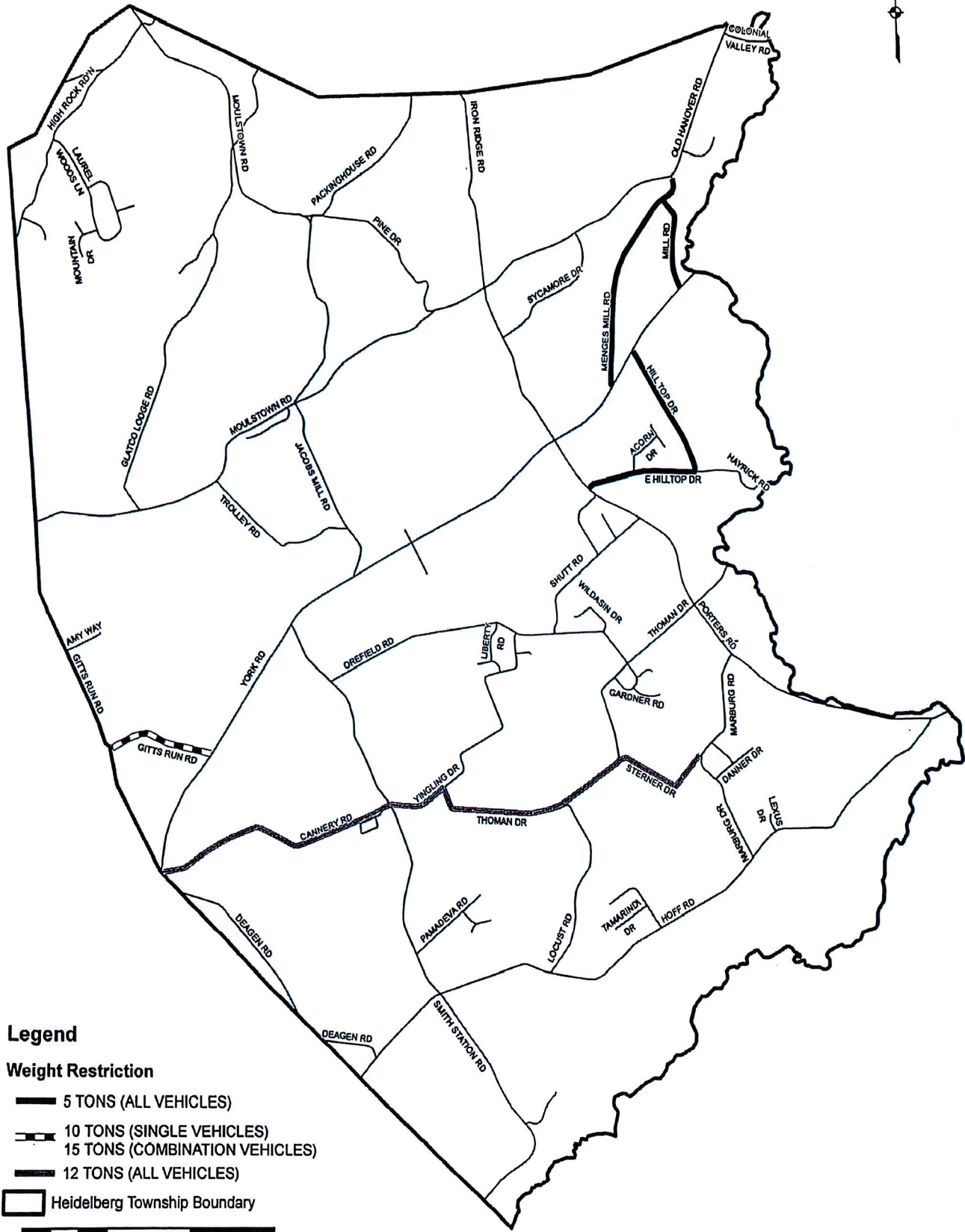

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE REGULATION OF
FIREWORKS WITHIN HEIDELBERG TOWNSHIP

The Board of Supervisors of Heidelberg Township, York County, Pennsylvania, enacts and ordains as follows:

FIREWORKS

ARTICLE I
GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. Purpose. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firms or corporations, amusement parks, fair associations or other organizations or groups of individuals, to possess or use Consumer Fireworks and Display Fireworks in violation of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Definitions.

BOARD - The Board of Supervisors of Heidelberg Township, York County, Pennsylvania.

BURN BAN - The declaration by any state or local agency or official that prohibits open or outside burning of any kind.

COMPETENT OPERATOR – An operator will be deemed competent pursuant to this Ordinance upon the discretionary approval of the Fire Chief who shall base his or her decision on an evaluation of documentation provided by a permit applicant concerning the proposed operator's age, past experiences, which includes the number, type, and location of completed displays, training, Attorney General registration, and at least two (2) references for the proposed operator.

DETAILED SITE PLAN - This plan shall include a description of the firing site, device layout, a complete and itemized list of all pyrotechnic devices to be displayed, including device and effect descriptions, quantities and sizes of aerial shells and ground display pieces, spectator location, fallout perimeter, distances between discharge area and spectator viewing areas, fireworks storage area, parking area, overhead utilities, streets and location of vehicles or readily combustible materials, proof of fire and police officials/equipment to be notified, and present and cleanup plan for display day and next morning.

FIRE CHIEF - The Fire Chief of Porters Fire Company or duly authorized representative.

FIREWORKS - Any composition or device designed to produce a visible or an audible effect by combustion, deflagration, or detonation, and which meets the definition of "Consumer Fireworks" or "Display Fireworks" as defined by this Section.

A. CONSUMER FIREWORKS - As defined in APA 87-1 or any successor standard, the sale, possession and use of which shall be permitted throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Consumer Fireworks shall not include devices as "ground and hand-held sparkling devices," "novelties", or "toy caps" in APA 87-1 or any successor standard.

B. DISPLAY FIREWORKS - Large fireworks to be used solely by professional, pyrotechnicians and designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration or detonation. The term includes, but is not limited to: (1) salutes that contain more than two grains or 1130 milligrams or explosive materials; (2) aerial shells containing more than 60 grams or pyrotechnic compositions; and (3) other display pieces that exceed the limits or explosive materials for classification as Consumer Fireworks and are classified as fireworks UN0333, UN0334 or UN0335 under 49 CFR172.101 (relating to purpose and use of hazardous materials table).

POLICE CHIEF - The Police Chief of the Southwestern Regional Police Department, or duly authorized representative.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY - The lawful owner of real property or a structure or, in the event the real property of structure is leased, the tenant in possession of real property or a structure.

TOWNSHIP – Heidelberg Township, York County, Pennsylvania.

In this Section, the singular shall include the plural, the plural shall include the singular; and the masculine shall include the feminine and the neuter.

ARTICLE II DISPLAY FIREWORKS

Section 3. Inspection. Every use of Display Fireworks within the limits of the Township shall be handled by a Competent Operator, and which display shall be of such character and so located, discharged or fired, as in the opinion of the Fire Chief, after proper inspection, shall not be hazardous to property or endanger any person or persons.

Section 4. Permit Application. An application for Display Fireworks permit(s) shall be made in writing to the Township at least forty-five (45) days in advance of the date of display, setting forth the proposed location of the display, the character thereof, a Detailed Site Plan, the names and addresses of all property owners located within 500 feet of the outermost edges of a proposed display's fall out perimeter, the name and address of the operator, and the name and address of the owner(w) of the grounds on which the display is to be held, with the consent of such owner(s) thereto in writing attached. All applicants, prior to the issuance of a permit, shall (a) pay the Township an application fee of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars; (b) provide proof of the required bond; and (c) pay the Township, for reimbursement to the fire department coverage during the fireworks display. All such fees identified herein may be amended by resolution of the Board, from time to time.

Section 5. Transferability. If and after such permit shall have been granted by the Board, possession and use of fireworks for such display shall be lawful for that purpose only. A permit granted hereunder shall be transferable, but only if the transferee meets all the requirements set forth within the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 6. Bond. The Board shall require a bond deemed adequate by it given by the permittee or licensee in an amount deemed appropriate by the Board, but will not be in a sum less than Two Million (\$2,000,000.00) Dollars, conditioned on the payment of all damages caused to any person or persons, and to any property by reason of the licensed display, and arising from any acts of the licensee, his or its agents, employees, or subcontractors, which bond shall be filed with the Township before any permit for a supervised public display of Display Fireworks is delivered.

Section 7. Continuance. If my reason of unfavorable weather the display for which a permit has been granted does not take place at the time so authorized, the person to whom such permit was issued may within twenty-four (24) hours apply to the authority having granted the same, setting forth under oath the fact that such display was not made, giving the reason therefor, and requesting a continuance of such permit for the day designated therein, not later than one (1) week after the day fixed originally in the permit. Upon receiving such application for a continuance, the authority, if it believes the facts stated therein are true, shall extend the provisions of the permit to the day fixed in the application, not later than one (1) week after the original day designated in the permit, and such extension of time shall be granted without the payment of any additional fee and without requiring any bond other than the one given for the original permit, the provisions of which shall extend to and cover all damages which may be caused by reason of the display taking place at such extended date in the same manner and to the same extent as if such display had taken place at the date originally fixed in the permit.

Section 8. Hours of Discharge. All permitted displays of Display Fireworks must occur between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 10:30 p.m., but may be extended to midnight on December 31 and from midnight to 12:30 a.m. on January 1.

ARTICLE III
CONSUMER FIREWORKS

Section 9. Hours of Discharge. Any use of Consumer Fireworks must occur between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 10:30 p.m.

Section 10. Duration of Discharge. A person shall not discharge Consumer Fireworks from any property for a period of time for more than sixty minutes, starting with the first discharge, in any given twenty-four (24) hour period, and two (2) additional sixty minute periods, each starting with the first discharge in any given ten (10) day period. In no event shall any person discharge Consumer Fireworks from any property more than three (3) days in any calendar year.

Section 11. Prohibited Discharge. The discharge of Consumer Fireworks shall be prohibited during any period during which a Burn Ban has been declared within the Township.

Section 12. Fireworks Law. In accordance with The Fireworks Law, Act 43 of 2017, as amended:

A. Conditions. A person who is at least 18 years of age and meets the requirements of the Fireworks Law may purchase, possess and use Consumer Fireworks.

B. Prohibitions. A person may not intentionally ignite or discharge:

a. Consumer Fireworks on public or private property without the express permission of the owner.

b. Consumer Fireworks or sparkling devices within, or throw Consumer Fireworks or sparkling devices from, a motor vehicle or building.

c. Consumer Fireworks or sparkling devices into or at a motor vehicle or building or at another person.

d. Consumer Fireworks or sparkling devices while the person is under the influence of alcohol, a controlled substance or another drug.

e. Consumer Fireworks within 150 feet of an occupied structure.

Section 13. It shall be unlawful for a Responsible Party to permit the possession or use of Consumer Fireworks on real property or a structure within the Responsible Party's possession in violation of this Chapter or The Fireworks Law.

ARTICLE IV
AGRICULTURAL FIREWORKS

Section 14. Purpose of Firework Use. Every use of Fireworks for an authorized agricultural purpose within the limits of the Township shall be in connection with the raising of crops and the protection of crops from bird and animal damage.

Section 15. Permit Application. An Application for the use of Fireworks for an agricultural purpose shall be made in writing to the Township at least forty-five (45) days in advance of the date of the use of Fireworks, setting forth the agricultural necessity for the discharge of Fireworks, specific type of Fireworks to be discharged, proposed dates and times of the discharge of Fireworks, a Detailed Site Plan, the names and addresses of all property owners located within 500 feet of the outermost edges of a proposed Firework's fall out perimeter, the name and address of the operator, and the name and address of the owner(s) of the grounds on which the use of Fireworks is to be held, with the consent of such owner(s) thereto in writing attached. All applicants, prior to the issuance of a permit, shall (a) pay the Township an application fee of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars; and (b) provide proof of the required bond. All such fees identified herein may be amended by resolution of the Board, from time to time. A permit for the discharge of Fireworks for an approved agricultural use shall be limited to Fireworks, dates, times and locations that permit the applicant to satisfy the purpose of this Article.

ARTICLE V
ADMINISTRATION

Section 16. Enforcement. This Ordinance shall be enforced by the Township employee designated by the Board or enforced by the Fire Chief and/or Police Chief.

Section 17. Penalties. Any person who shall violate any provision of this Section shall, upon conviction thereof, be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars and costs, and, in default of payment, to undergo imprisonment for a term not to exceed thirty (30) days. All prosecutions shall be brought before the Magisterial District Judge having jurisdiction of summary violations that occur in the Township.

Section 18. Nonexclusivity. All provisions of this Ordinance are applicable in addition to and in accordance with any and all provisions set forth in Pennsylvania state law and any fire code or other rule or regulation duly adopted by the Township.

Section 19. Conflicting Provisions. If any provisions of this Ordinance should conflict with provisions of Pennsylvania state law, any fire code or other rule or regulation duly adopted by the Township, the state law, regulation, or fire code shall prevail.

Section 20. All Ordinances or parts thereof that are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.


